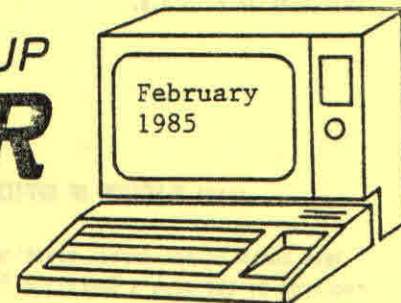

***** KEY COMMAND CHANGES *****

From the January 1985 issue of the Atlanta 99/4A Computer Users Group newsletter CALL NEWSLETTER is an interesting article for those of you who are lucky enough to have word processing. This article applies to systems using the TI-WRITER and a Gemini 10X printer. (This article was originally copied from the 'Suncoast Beeper' newsletter of the Suncoast 99'er Users Group.)

*The program below shows you how to print from the EDIT mode of TI-WRITER. By pressing 'CTRL' and 'U' your cursor changes into an underline character, denoting that you are writing control characters to the document that the 99/4A will obey. At the end of the article the author states that these controls also work in Basic and Extended Basic. These keys can be used to control the printer out of a Basic or Extended Basic program, or direct from the command mode of the computer. ***** WARNING ***** I do not recommend using these in multiplan or any other program which is using CTRL or FCTN keys to control editing. Have fun with these and experiment.*

***** PROGRAMMING HINTS *****

From the Atlanta 99/4A Computer Users Group newsletter CALL NEWSLETTER comes a few programming hints that may be of interest:

1. You probably already know this, but did you know that you don't have to type in the blank spaces before the ":" in multiple statements while programming in Extended Basic? Just type everything together (100 CALL CLEAR::RANDOMIZE::FOR D=1 TO 100::NEXT D) and the computer will separate it for you when you press ENTER.
2. Have you ever had difficulty finding which joystick is to be used in a program? If the program was written for joystick #1 then joystick #2 won't work, and vice versa. Add the following lines at the beginning of the program and let the computer do the work:

```

100 PRINT "PRESS FIRE BUTTON TO CONTINUE"
110 CALL KEY(1,K1,S)
120 CALL KEY(2,K2,S)
130 IF K1+K2<>17 THEN 110
140 JS=INT(K1/18+K2/9+1)

```

Now replace the CALL JOYST statement in the program with: XXX CALL JOYST(JS,X,Y). The program will respond to whichever of the two joysticks you were holding when you pressed the fire button.

From the January 1985 issue of the Pittsburgh Users Group newsletter PERIPHERAL is an interesting article on using nested loops while programming. For a lot of you this may be old information, but for some - :-

A loop is performed on the computer using the 'FOR-NEXT' statement. The format is as follows: FOR (variable) = (starting value) TO (ending value) STEP (increment) NEXT (variable). If you are not already familiar with this concept, I suggest that you refer to the users Reference Guide.

By 'nesting' one loop within another we are able to manipulate numbers with incredible simplicity. Here are examples:

LEGAL

```

100 FOR X=1 TO 10
110 FOR Y=1 TO 20
120 FOR Z=50 TO 1 STEP -1
130 PRINT X,Y,Z,X*Y*Z
140 NEXT Z
150 NEXT Y
160 NEXT X

```

ILLEGAL

```

100 FOR X=1 TO 10
110 FOR Y=1 TO 20
120 FOR Z=50 TO 1 STEP -1
130 PRINT X,Y,Z,X*Y*Z
140 NEXT X
150 NEXT Z
160 NEXT Y

```

The program on the left prints out a multiplication table. The program on the right **WILL NOT WORK!** The paths of the loops cannot intersect, otherwise you have illegal nesting. Notice that line 120 is acceptable.

Nested loops work wonders with multi-dimensional arrays, sorting, and tables. You may incorporate as many loops into your program as you like, just remember to 'trace' their path to be certain that they do not interfere with each other. Also, you could alter the output to be any form you like, such as the following line, which is perfectly valid:

```
130 PRINT X^.5,LOG(Y)*ABS(Z),SIN(X),SGN(Y)
```

This concept is one of the major advantages of a computer over a calculator."
