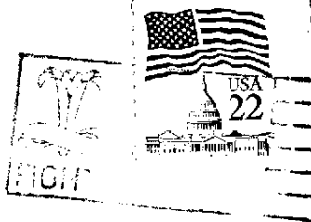

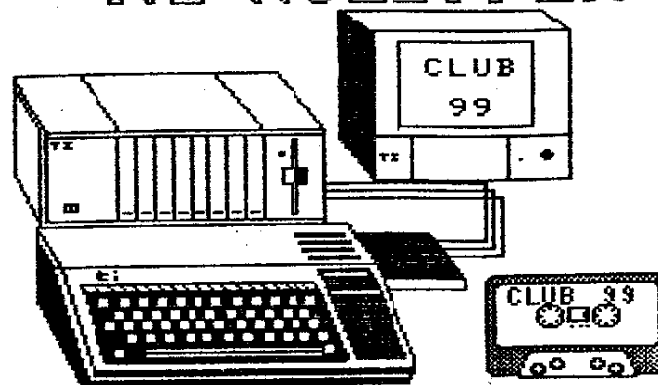

The following interesting and sad but true article was first printed in the LA-99ers Topics Newsletter and reprinted by the MUNCH Users Group. Please take heed and don't sour any more good FAREWARE programmers.

EDITORIAL

(Or how to kill the TI-99 in one easy lesson)

Those of you who read this newsletter regularly will know that we have long taken a public stand against software piracy. Up to this time Terrie has been the most vocal (or most read) but she has full support. It is time for me publicly state my position, borne of bitter personal experience.

I had never touched a computer before I got my TI. It was originally a toy for me as it was for many of you, such a toy! It quickly became a learning tool, and was not only a means to other ends, but an end itself, as I learned the joy of programming. I am largely self-taught, through a lot of HARD work, and the help of my friends, and I have achieved a position I never thought possible just a few years ago.

My first "extensive" venture a few years ago was a combination XBasic and Assembly graphics utility called EASYSprite. I vainly tried to market it, without any real financial backing and therefore limited success. When I first heard about about FREEMWARE (which I now think of as "STEALWARE") I decided to go that route. For your information I have recieved payment for LESS THEN one out of TWENTY copies that I have sent out.

My last venture was DISKASSEMBLER. Since I thought that my main problem was public awareness of my efforts (i.e. advertising) I felt that going with Miller's Graphics would be more succesful. Let me tell you that I worked long and hard on that program (11 months, the gestation of an elephant), trying to make it perfect ON THE FIRST VERSION to be released. I have a wife and two children who wish they had never heard of it, and wondered if they would ever really have me back again.

Now I know what the TI community thinks of efforts such as mine. It wasn't long before DISKASSEMBLER was in the trading routes and even on BBS's. What do those of you using pirated versions really think you are accomplishing?

And I am by no means the only victim of this vicious practice! The TI-99/4A, being an "orphan", is in a peculiar position. Currently manufactured computers have an ever-expanding market, as new users come on line. Therefore software authors can count at least on sales to those who do not yet have access to pirated versions. The TI, on the other hand, since the rush of new users who bought at the "close-out" sales, has a relatively stable market. It has been said that there are several million 99/4A's out there, but I recently heard an estimate that there are probably only 250,000 or so actually in use, rather than in the closet. Many already know the good sources of software are. I strongly believe that those who are trying to make even a little money on this computer, and the VERY few who are trying to MAKE A LIVING with it, will shortly be getting out of the market, unless the piracy stops.

You may have noticed that there really isn't that much software produced anymore. There are a lot of good programs that are constantly being revised, as the bugs are noticed and worked out by the users. You need umpteen disks and a lot of patience to get a properly working version. Software of serious commercial quality takes TIME, and the motivation to make the time comes from rewards, both monetary and personal. It really galls me to see the pirates not only steal the programs, but even take the authors name off them, so the unwitting recipient doesn't even know who to thank! And here's another amazing idea to consider. Even when you BUY the programs being marketed for the TI, you are paying 1/3 to 1/10 the cost of similar programs for other computers! In other words, you are already getting a bargain - why destroy it???

Recently a major software producer announced that he would stop producing for the 99/4A because of piracy, in particular because he had found his programs on bulletin boards. A great hue and cry went up and he did rescend his decision. But I have still seen his programs on BBS's for free downloading. You sysops MUST police your boards better!

Now let me sum this up. As implied by the statement under the title, the continued well-being of the 99/4A is UP TO YOU. Unless you are willing to support the continued production of quality software by paying the very reasonable amounts that the authors and software companies charge for their programs, you will see the market disappear. PLEASE DON'T LET THIS HAPPEN!

DISK REVIEW by MIKE BATES

This month's review is of a disk in the Club library labeled TEXTNET-2. It is a disk full of games for all you incorragable gamers out there.

#004-B: In this game you are driving a car and trying to run over monsters without hitting any trees. Your car only turns left so it is not quite as easy as it sounds. There are four levels of play.

#006-B: This is a computerized version of a craps game. It is somewhat slow but still pretty good.

#031-XB or B: You play the computer in a game of "NIMS" and try to remove the last stick. There are three levels of play in which the amount of sticks are changed and five kinds of opponents for you to compete against.

Aircombat-B: A multi-level war game in which you pilot a plane of the future. Use the joy stick and fire button to attempt to destroy enemy aircraft.

Battieship-B: This one uses a 10x10 grid to play a computerized version of the classic strategy game.

Checkers2-B: The ever popular game of checkers. You might have to use a Call Files() if you get a memory full message.

Go-Home-B: In this one you try to move your marker "home" which is the upper left space. You can only move 3 ways and can move any number of spaces as long as it is in a straight line.

Lexical-B: This is a word game called Lexicality, in which up to four players try to build words of as many letters as possible using random letters supplied by the computer.

Puzzle15-B: A 4x4 grid is filled with numbers from 1-15 (one blank space). The object is to re-arrange the numbers in correct order. There are four levels of difficulty to challenge you.

White/Hole-B: In this one you have a laser gun which you use to track and destroy mysterious "white-holes" which have escaped during an experiment. It uses keyboard or joystick input and has four levels of play.

Zap-a-Ball-B: You use a joystick to move and fire at opposing targets in this one.

THE IBM CONNECTION

The following announcement from M6 was reprinted from the February NUTMEG TI-99ers.

ANNOUNCEMENT

IBM COMPATIBILITY FOR THE 99/4A
Technical Info:

1. Two part system. A TURBO XT and a small bridge box that connects to the side I/O port on your 4A.
2. The TURBO XT is an 8 Mhz, 4.77 Mhz (switchable) motherboard, power supply, XT style case, CGA color graphics card (both RGB and Composite) Floppy Disk Controller 1 half high DS/DD disk drive, Parallel port and 256K of RAM on the motherboard. The motherboard has sockets for up to 640K of RAM. There are 8 expander slots, two of which are used by the CGA card and the Floppy Disk Controller.
3. The bridge box has inputs for 4A Video in, XT Video in and outputs for the XT keyboard out and Monitor out. It also contains the software for Keyboard switching between 4A mode and XT mode and the software to convert 4A key strokes into XT keycodes. It also has a pass through so you can keep your P-box or the Peripherals hooked up.
4. Mode switching from 4A to XT can be done through Basic or X-Basic with CALL XT or by holding F1CN CTRL ENTER or power up of the 4A.
5. Mode switching from XT to 4A is done by pressing F1CN CTRL ENTER.
6. The ONLY items shared by the two systems are the 4A keyboard and your current monitor or TV. Yes you can get 80 columns out of a composite monitor, but it is easiest to read with the color turned off in 80 mode. The XT allows MODE 40 which also gives you 40 column mode. Graphics programs, such as games and drawing programs work fine in 80 column and most other software that doesn't combine weird foreground and background text colors are also quite readable.
7. By not sharing the disk drives it is possible to do concurrent processing on the XT. Example: Go into XT mode, start up your COMMUNICATIONS software, log on to a BBS and start and start a download. Now you can switch modes back to the 4A and do whatever you would like in 4A mode while the XT is still down loading from the BBS!!!
8. We have tested this system on a number of 4A system configurations and have found it very compatible with both IBM software and IBM HARDWARE. Yes, you can add ANY IBM cards you would like to the system.

9. The minimum 4A system requirements: A TI99/4A console and a monitor or a TV set with RF modulator.

General Info:

1. This system is being marketed by Triton Products Company in San Francisco, CA. They are also handling the production of the bridge boxes and they have contracted for the Turbo XI clones to their specifications.
2. The system has a 30 DAY money back guarantee and a 1 YEAR parts and labor warranty.
3. The cost for this system (Turbo XT, Bridge Box, and cables) is \$499.00 plus 19.90 for shipping and handling.
4. Their toll free number for additional info and/or a 6 page, 4 color brochure on this system is 1-800-227-6900 Monday through Friday - 6AM to 6PM and Saturday 9AM to 4PM, Pacific Time.
5. Delivery is scheduled to start on March 1st of this year. We have been using this system for awhile now and we are very pleased with its performance. This isn't vaporware, ALL R), testing and software is complete and the units are ready for production, so the March time frame is a reality. At last a MAJOR expansion for the 4A. We hope you are as pleased with this product as you have been with our other products in the past. As the Triton Brochure says: MAKE THE IBM CONNECTION TO YOUR TI99/4A

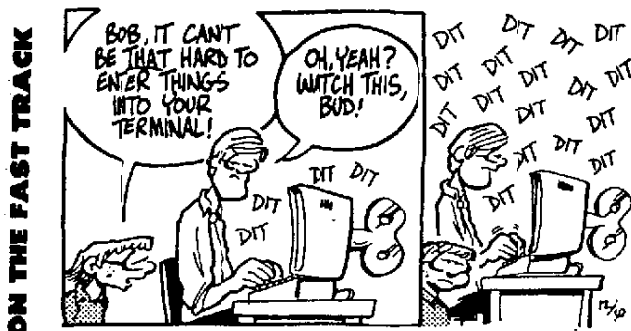
