THE PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Well, things are not all that different for the Hoosier Users Group. Every year is an election year for our Officers. So far the Nominating Committee (myself, Mark Bladoc, and anyone else interested) has received notice of intent to run from Steve Sims (for the Office of President), Barb Uhrig (for the office of Secretary), and Indpls' Bill Jones for the Office of Treasurer). Obviously we are now looking for the candidate seeking the Office of Vice President. Part of this individual's responsibilities will be the 'care and feeding of our ever growing User Group Library. [Thank you Phil Caldwell for your recent contributions!] Our Constitution has some very explicit guidelines regarding the election of Officers, so if you are even remotely interested, please let us know and we will be glad to forward a copy for you to look over.

One of the pleasant surprises in the past month was a Care Package from TI that contained the manual and a diskette for implementing TI FORTH, a hybrid computer language that allows the programmer to construct programs that will run with the speed of Assembly language and yet are as easy to read/understand as BASIC. The only hitch, however, is that TI FORTH requires the Editor Assembler cartridge, 32K memory and a disk drive/controller. Editor Assembler cartridges are becoming harder to come by now that (according to my sources) TI has destroyed all the ones it could not sell. So if you don't already have the cartridge, this latest 'gift' from TI is like receiving one shoe for Christmas! For those of you who would like to learn another programming language, one that opens the door to many of the 99/4A's inner workings, then TI FORTH is just for you. The Users Group is investigating the cost of reproducing the manual and the diskette. The manual alone, if printed locally, would run about \$18.00 (120 sheets X 2 sides X 7 cents plus punching/binding). If we have to provide the diskettes it will be a couple of dollars more. If interested, write or see one of the officers at the next meeting (March 11th).

During the 'dramatic pause' that the Hoosier Users Group has taken before setting up its own Bulletin Board System (BBS), Bob Brattain has been working to set up a BBS for TI owners/users. Final arrangements are being held up, not surprisingly, by a lack of funds. Your new or renewal membership and/or a special contribution to our BBS Fund would certainly move things along. At the last HUGgers meeting much interest was expressed about the Axiom Direct-Connect Printers. Mr. James Franks, Applications Engineer for Axiom Corporation has provided some information in addition to the brochures.

These printers connect to the TI 99/4A without the need for a P-Box or RS-232 interface. The biggest question at the last meeting was "where does the printer plug into the console?" According to Mr. Franks, the printer plugs into the same outlet that the P-Box and Speech Synthesizer use. However! Mr. Franks happily points out that we can still keep our P-Boxes plugged in!

The printer plug is a "t" connector with an extra port at a right angle to the connector to plug in other peripherals. The secret to the direct connect is a Centronics parallel to parallel interface. While the interface is not an RS-232 it has been designed to answer to the RS-232 port command in your software. By the way, the "bottom line" printer, the GP-100, has true descenders! (i.e., the lower case o's and y's look like o's and y's).

DON'T REPRESS THE URGE TO SUPPRESS A SURGE!

I have heard from many of you who have power problems that are causing you great concern when you are using your computer. Perhaps you could avoid most of these problems by taking a few easy and inexpensive safety precautions. For instance, the December, 1983 issue of BYTE magazine features an article dealing with these problems. Read it! This guy was operating his computer during an electrical storm, an absolute no no!

You should be using a line voltage suppressor with a maximum voltage tolerance of about 130 volts A.C. Some of these suppressors don't knock the voltage down until it hits 500 volts! Needless to say, when it gets that high there isn't any point in worrying about your equipment!

Try to keep your equipment away from fluorescent lights, as they can cause all sorts of quirks in your equipment. Especially a faulty starter in the older models. You can also have difficulties from a power drain or voltage spike. These can be caused by an electrical appliance engaged with a high amperage drain on the same circuit as your computer; such as a dish washer, toaster, iron or refrigerator. This can cause a momentary change in power and it can affect, and sometimes, damage, your equipment. Avoid static electricity, as it is an instant killer for disks, tapes, and all electronic hardware! Use anti static spray on your carpet if it is a problem. With a little common sense you can avoid the problems, so go visit Radio Shack and spend a few dollars for some peace of mind and computer security!

This cartridge is marketed by Atari, as a part of the AtariSoft game software for the TI home computer. It is directly compatible with the TI 99/4 and TI 99/4A, and it is in the "under forty dollars" category.

When my son wanted to buy it, I told him not to expect too much, as most home video games do not even come close to the "arcade" versions and usually are disappointing to say the least. Well, this game is spectacular! The action is fast and challenging and the graphics are an absolute joy to watch.

The game is divided up into levels and screens get harder with each level. When you reach the third level, you get all of the three different screens. The game gives you another man at the seven-thousand score level and this is the only extra men you get.

The first screen, is the famous one, where King Kong rolls barrels down on our hero. The more time you take to rescue his girl friend, the more barrels he will roll down. There also is a bonus clock that counts down your bonus score also. When you jump a barrel you get 100 points, but when you jump two at once, you get 300 points. You still must to get a good bonus score as the bonus score is decreased by 100 every two seconds.

The documentation that come with the game is brief but well done in five colors. The game is well defined and it even has some tips on strategy. The cartridge is well built and the case is very strong.

Space doesn't allow me to describe all of this very good game, but I think that this is the very best game I have ever seen on a home computer. I would have to give this one a rating of 9.5, on a scale of 1 to 10.

LIBRARY BITS

KNIGHT'S TOUR is a fascinating program in BASIC which is listed in our library under the name KNIGHT'S. It is actually a puzzle. To try this puzzle, you must know the movement of a Knight in the game of chess.

The Knight moves one square up or down, then two squares right or left. Alternatively, it can move one square left or right, then two squares up or down. This move will always shift the knight from one color square, to a square of the opposite color. This is the hard part.

The object of the puzzle is to start your knight on the square of your choice, then move it to every other square on the board---without visiting any square a second time. It can be accomplished, but it is difficult. It requires considerable thought and the ability to plan ahead.

You can spend several hours trying to solve this puzzle. If you give up, the program provides a solution to the problem.

GOLF is an Extended BASIC game for one or two players. It presents 9 different holes, complete with trees and sand traps. An arrow located next to the ball can be pointed in 8 different directions. A golfer shown in the upper left part of the screen shows you how hard you are going to hit the ball.

Instructions are weak in this program. You are told that for player # 1, the S D Keys control the direction of the arrow. The Q Key controls how hard the ball is hit. There is nothing about player # 2! For player # 2, the J K keys control the arrow, and the Y key controls how hard the ball is hit. This game can be played by young and old alike. Joysticks are not required.
