

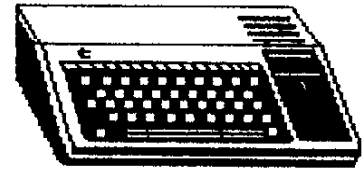

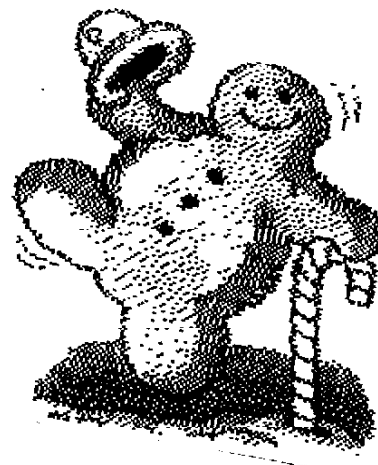
AND FINALLY...

# **Kawartha 99ers helping novices to overcome their computer phobias**

Home computers have become a popular way of managing the budget, completing homework and playing games.

But for those who are still struggling to understand the computer and its changing terminology and capabilities, a home computer can really just become an expensive headache that ends up being shoved in a closet.

An area support group for owners of Texas Instrument computers is helping to put an end to the confusion about computers as well as introduce owners to new programs and software available for the machine. The Kawartha 99ers is a non-profit group organized solely for individuals who have an interest in the Texas Instrument home computer.

"(The group) is not going to make us rich or wealthy," Kawartha 99ers member Phil Townsend says. "It's just for people struggling along with their computer."

Many people who own a Texas Instrument computer, Mr. Townsend says, don't even realize its capabilities. With updated components, software and programs, the computer can possess almost all the same features of a newer computer, but at a

much lower price, he says. And the computer and its programs are versatile enough for children to use for games or homework or for parents to use it for budgeting or to create desk top publishing.

The Kawartha 99ers produce a monthly newsletter about various programs or software and help members understand or update the Texas Instrument computers. The local group also has a cassette, disc and module library for members. The group even gives members a chance to show off to others the things they have discovered with the computer, Mr. Townsend says.

"To meet and just talk about the computer would be boring," Mr. Townsend says. "But to talk about how a person uses the machine is interesting."

The Kawartha 99ers began in 1983 when a group of about six area residents would meet in each others homes to discuss the computer.

"It was just to help each other out because at that point home computers were fairly recent and no one knew very much about them," Mr. Townsend says.

In 1985, Texas Instrument stopped producing the home computer, he says, but company representatives went out to help set up or aid user groups under-

stand more about the computer.

User groups have since sprung up around the world, Mr. Townsend says, and membership of the Kawartha 99ers varies but averages at 35 people.

The group meets the second Wednesday of every month at the city police station at 7 p.m., and often joins other groups for conventions and festivals to keep member's programs up-to-date.

And twice a year, the Kawartha 99ers hold displays around the city to let area residents know the capabilities of the computer and that help is available to them.

"It's to let owners of this model know there is help out there if they want it," Mr. Townsend says.

Membership to the group costs \$18 a year and entitles participants to use the libraries and receive the monthly newsletter.

But more than that, Kawartha 99ers vice-president Glen Daniels says, members have a lot of fun and meet people.

"The social side of the group is very important," Mr. Daniels says. "And very often we get to know people all over the world through the newsletters."

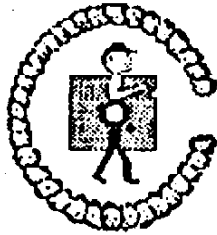

While these programs are essentially the same as JIFFY CARD and JIFFY FLYER 3.0, one can view and change the colors of the large font, small font, graphics, border and block character to achieve 5 color output. Each page of the card is independent of the other. These packages are complete with all graphics included, but since it uses CSGD/GR graphics many more are available. All graphic placement except borders is totally in your control in this 100% display perfect program. These programs written by Rodger Merritt are enhanced by the ingenious color printing routine by Adrian Robinson that can produce a double density finished product in 4 minutes on a Star XR-1000. The CARD programs even come with an envelope template. Prices for these products are COLOR CARD \$28.00 CDN COLOR FLYER \$20.00 CDN + s/h

CARDS/FLYER GRAPHICS are a collection of new fonts and borders that can be merged into JIFFY CARD, JIFFY FLYER, COLOR CARD or COLOR FLYER. Borders may alternately be entered while using the program using the new feature in the latest versions. Borders and codes are displayed in the manual for easy referencing. Also a fantastic Border designer is supplied that when created gives a graphic printout complete with hex codes and file name. CARDS 4ALL OCCASIONS is a collection of 13 creative cards on disk that can be loaded and printed by the above CARD programs. These include Christmas, Birthday, Mother's Day, Valentine's Day and other special occasions to be remembered. This variety pack also demonstrates the creative possibilities of the CARD programs. They may be edited for that personal touch. Both of these programs at \$12 each + s/h will pay for themselves as they reduce your card costs by 99%.

LIVING TOMB and WAR ZONE are new 100% assembly very professional games written by a 14 year old prodigy. Quinton Tormanon, at the age of 11 began teaching himself assembly language. Now after 3 years he has emerged from his room with 2 amazing games with more on the way. LIVING TOMB is a 3D D and D inspired adventure game with fantastic graphics, sound, animation, speech(not necessary) and intricate scorekeeping. It uses colorful overlaid pop up windows to check weapons, armor, treasures, inventory, customize, search and many other options. All joystick controlled you could move through this full screen underground maze at the rate of 10 rooms a second but you had better not because of the demons, traps and hidden rooms that are around every corner. Even in death you attain a score and the top all time high scores are written to disk. Both programs have a self running Demo mode till you begin play. WAR ZONE is a fast arcade game with an ever increasing level of difficulty, dictated by new screens, increased numbers, speed, weapons and terrain. A very neat feature is the ability to Continue up the levels after being killed(score is reset). Getting experience at the higher levels makes the lower levels easier when you restart there. The top 5 scores of the day are kept while the top 10 all time scores are saved to disk. LIVING TOMB is \$17 + s/h and WAR ZONE is \$12 + s/h.

ARTIST PRINT SHOP is an exciting new companion to TI-ARTIST(tm) users. Using simple menus at Assembly language speed this package of 3 useful printing functions uses all Fonts and Instances without modification or conversion. They all give you the option of a single or double density output on any Epson compatible printer. All instance options allow mirroring the image. All layout, spacing and centering is calculated and done by the program. If the Font characters were saved proportionally then they will be printed that way as all text input is based on dot calculations. One can create and print a custom Letterhead with 2 instances, 1 line of any large font and 3 lines of 1 char high font with a bottom line in 5 minutes. A 5 foot banner, using any font, bookended(if one wishes) by 2 instances, would take 10 minutes. One has the option of the size of both as maximum magnification to fit on the page is given. One may then choose auto centering or tabbing the font or instance to give full control to the user. This would allow one to put several lines of text across the banner. One may also choose solid or block(white space around small blocks). The signmaker makes this a perfect package and a bargain at twice the price. One starts by loading up to 5(any size) instances and 1(any size) font and one 1 high char font. This program then lets one layout these graphics and text anywhere. Both fonts and instances may be regular size or magnified. That means a 5 high font could be 10 char high and a 24 char high instance could be 48 or a half page high. One may use those 5 graphics more than once on a page and any place where one chooses graphic only one is given how many across will fit in that area(e.g. 1-7). One may then select and that many will be centered and evenly spaced. There is a very smart scan feature that lets one always know how the page is layed out and gives the option to change. When one goes to print they may choose 1 of the 13 borders supplied. This package created by Paul Coleman has shown him to be the master of Fonts and Instances and with this you will be too. This 3 disk collection along with a detailed manual is just \$28 + s/h.
