

I would like to thank those people that came up to me at the last meeting and vounteered to type a few articles for me for use in the newsletter! I really appreciate it! I like doing the newsletter but I just do not have the time to type all 16 pages in myself!

AT the last meeting we had one of the largest crouds that we have ever had at a meeting in a long time. I hope the trend continues... I would also like to welcome a few visitors who attended our last meeting, Marc Martin, Michael Dorman, Jeanette Martin, Mr & Mrs E.F. Williamson, I hope you decide to join us.

I would like to apologize for our last newsletter being very late. The copy machine we use broke down and a copy place wanted to charge an OUTRAGEOUS price to copy it so we elected to copy it when the copier was repaired, so there was little that we could do... I tried to call many of the members of the group though to let them know of the membing. Sorry for any inconvenience. This will hopfully not happen again!

Our TIBBS (901-357-5425) is now running at 300/1200 baud! To. Friday after our meeting we received our new Myarc 300/1200 modes from Texaments. If you have a 1200 baud modem and a 1200 baud terminal program you can now call at the higher speed. Of course, those of us that only have 300 baud (me included) can still call at 300 band. Currently we have about 350 users of our board from people all over the country and as far away as Canada. We also have one of the largest and most advanced TIBBS's in the country with 1 MEG of disk storage space. Corcomp DS/DD controler, 3 DS/DD drives. Corcomp Triple Tech card with 64K printer buffer and now running at 300/1200 baud! We maintain an average of about 30 downloads (programs available for transfer from our system to yours). If you have your modes stuck back in the closet now is the time to call. For best results use the TE2 cartridge or FAST-TERM when you call. To use TE2 simply select DEFAULT option. put modem on full duplex (FD), Originate (if it has these settings) and dial (901) 357-5425 24 hours a day and all the instructions will be displayed on the screen for you. One note your backspace key when on the modes is not FCTN S but CTRL H! See you on TIBBS....

Downloads and Uploads are now available for T1 on a local pay board called TBBS T.U.G. using the XMODEM protocal of FAST-TERM. XMODEM protocal is twice as fast as TE2 transfers! Me and Stephen is are the Sub-Sysops of the TI-Sig on the board. T.U.G. is on \$10 a year, call for details. The number is 358-TBBS or 358-8227. Make sure you say I sent you!

TIDBIT TIPS

Nant to advoid having to type OLD DSK1.PROGRAM and then RUN to load and run a program then type one of the following commands in XB depending on what device you are loading from:

RUN "DSK1.PROGRAM" OR RUN "CS1"

Do you have problems with not enough memory when you bought a disk drive? Connecting a disk drive to your system will take about 3K of memory. However, using the following statement you can pull 2K of it back. Also if you have trouble loading a program after you connected your disk drive but it worked loaded fine before you got your disk drive this may eliminate your problem also.

CALL FILES(1)

This works in both BASIC and Extended BASIC. You can see how much memory you save by typing SIZE (in XB) before and after the statement. The extra memory is retained as long as you do not go back to the title screen... This memory retainer trick will only work if you have a disk system.

For those of you that have modems as well as call waiting you can now disable call waiting! If you are not familiar with what I am talking about, call waiting will knock you off a system if you get a call while connected as just the momentary disconnection will be enough for the system you are online with to hang up on you. To disable call waiting punch the following command into your phone before dialing the number.

\$ 70 (touch tone) or 1170 (rotary dial)

After your call your phone will be set back to normal so you will need to make that command each time you call to turn off call waiting.

HELP!

Thats what you will be saying if you don't install a surge protection on your computer and other equipment, including your phone line if you have a direct connect modem. Lightning striking your line or power surges by other causes could blow your expensive computer equipment! A surge protector is the insurance against this. Although nothing is 100% protection a surge protector will give you some protection than nothing. Fuses and circuit breakers will NOT stop sudden and momentary surges as they are too fast for the fuse to blow or the circuit breaker to trip. Even if your equipment is turned off if it is still plugged in a surge could jump the contacts in the switch! The best surge protector I know of that you can get locally, is one called Wire Tree which Bill Stewart of Stewart Software Co. has, but it cost \$89.95 + tax. Some of the features are, an input for the phone line coming from the phone company, an output to your modem via phone line, as well as six outlets, switch, and circuit breaker. It also includes RFI Rejection. Then there are some cheeper ones that you can buy with one outlett protection or in power strip form.

However, I will demonstrate how to make an inexpensive one a few dollars, using an existing plug strip and two parts from Warren Radio Co. at the next meeting.

VOLCANO FORTRESS REVIEW

Volcano Fortress is a new game written by John Behnke of Asgard Software for use by the Tunnels of Doom cartridge. Those (me included) who bought the Tunnels of Doom cartridge were promised by TI to have additional adventures for it like with the Adventure cartridge. However, this never did happen and now a new adventure is out. Here is a summory of the senero...

Many years ago, a very powerful wizard used his great magic to carve a fortress into a mighty volcano. For generations, thousands of explorers have searched for his fortress to obtain the treasures that taunt from legends and fables. However, none but you have discovered the secret entrance to this volcano fortress. The legends say inside the fortress lies many wonderful treasures; giant diamonds, wondrous magic items, weapons beyond number, and four great enchanted chests and the four keys that unlock the chests. However, the legends also say that the wizards fortress is not unguarded. It is said that he created metal demois (called "robots") and summoned the evil undead to protect his treasure. Incredible though it sounds, you have heard that some of these creatures are invisible, and thus cannot be seen until they attack!

After playing the game I found it very enjoyable expecially since I have never seen another adventure for the TOD cartridge except the one that came with it. Those of you that have never in the TOD cartridge are really missing out on a good game. The TOD cartridge are really missing out on a good game while of Doom may be compaired to the adventure cartridge except here graphits are displayed instead of text and Tunnels of Doom is a lot more fun because you can see what is going on instead of just reading it! You actually see a forward view on the screen as you walk though the tunnels and an overhead view when you go into the rooms. 
LOAD INTERRUPT SWITCH

Several programs on the market requires the use of a load interrupt switch in order to operate. Screen Dump (in our library) by Danny Michael is one of these programs. These programs are loaded into low 32K memory where when you press the load interrupt switch they are executed. For example, the Screen Dump is first loaded into memory then you can place a cartridge in the computer and when you press the load interrupt switch the other program is executed which in this came it dumps all the graphics on the screen to a printer. You can buy this switch from CorComp for about \$12 or you can make one of your own using the following instructions.

Have someone competent with computers and electronics wire this if you want to use it and you don't want to do it yourself. Carefully count the pins when making the connections. TRIPLE CHECK YOUR WORK!!!!!!

The switch and its connections may be placed anywhere on the 10 bus. (Inside the console, PEB or speech synthesizer.) The speech synthesizer is the most convenient and the switch can be glued down or mounted unter the cover that tilts up and away from small children and other accidental use. The best switch to use is a microswitch such as Radio Shack #275-016. However, for console mounting a push button switch of high quality will do. MAKE SURE YOU GET THE NORMALLY OPEN CONTACTS!!

Use of the switch when a program that uses it is not loaded into memory will lock up the computer in which case you will have to reset... However, you install this switch AT YOUR OWN RISK!... Refer to the TI 99/4A Technical Data Manuel for further details if desired. The schematic is below:

GRAM-KARTE AND 80 COLUMN...

Products from Mechatronic GmBH of Germany are now available in the United States through Techinal Application Product Engineering Ltd. of Ontario, California.

An 80-column card for the TI is scheduled for March release, according to Franz Wagenbach of T.A.P.E. He says that the German manufacturer says that the card is compatable with existing software and can switch from 80 to 40 columns.

The card is expected to be priced at approximately \$200, Wagenbach says. BASIC II+ at \$79.95 is now available according to Wagenbach. The program, reviewed in the October MICROpendium, allows the user to produce high resolution graphics in XBASIC by using the 60 additional commands built into the XBII + cartridge.

A 128K memory expansion is available as a plug-in module with built-in centronics port and print spooling functions for \$147.95. An internal RAM card version is scheduled for January release at \$157.95.

Also schedules for January release is the GRAM-KARTE by Heiner Martin author of TI Intern.

GRAM-KARTE, prices at \$249.50 is said to allow the user transfer the contents of any cartridge to disk and to reload onto the card the contents of up to six cartridges, which are then menu accessed. Up to three GRAM-KARTES can be loaded into the PEB. (sounds similar to a GRAM Kracker which is from Millers Graphics.)

After the module is loaded into the GRAM-KARTE, the program can be modified and them saved to disk. GRAM-KARTE is said to be fully compatible with TI and CorComp controllers. Wagenbach says it has not yet been tested on the Myarc controller.

An English version of TI99/4A Intern: The Operating system of the TI99/4A ROM and GROM listing with Commentary and Directions for GPL by Heiner Martin, is available from T.A.P.E. for \$17.95

Also promised for January are a mouse which Wagenbach says provides PC-like screen icon graphics, priced at \$98, and an EPROMer at \$129.50.

Scheduled for release in March is the QUICK DISK drive for 2.8 inch minidisks. Wagenbach says it is a self contained disk drive and controller which does not need an expansion box, and will work with the CC40 as well as with the TI99/4A. Price is \$199.95.

The company is also offering Fig-Forth in cartridge fora for

\$49.95. Orders are being taken now for probable April delivery, Magembach says.

FOUNDATION COMPUTING IS OUT!

Foundation Computing has gone out of business, and Kathy Hunter, vice president of marketing, described the firm as "financially bankrupt."

Foundation manufactured the 280 card and 80-column card for the Ti99/4A, as well as 32K and 128K memory cards for the machine. Hunter described the firm's leaving business as resulting from a combination of events. The company which manufactured foundation's boards went bankrupt "with the boards in tow," she said. She also noted that components supplied from a major company to Foundation "were faulty."

She said the company will continue to offer maintenance and repairs for persons wishing support. For products under werranty, the customer will pay only the shipping and for products not under warranty, the customer will be charged \$35 plus shipping.

One note, I have found that the Foundations 128K card would not work with several new programs out such as GRAPHX! On the other hand, MYARC sells a 128K of their own which is expandable to 512K! The card includes a RAM disk, and print spooler routines. You can store programs in memory and recall them instantly. You access the 128K with 32K bank switching similiar if not exactly like the Foundation card. The 128K card is available from TENEX for \$199 or you can get the 128K and new Myarc Extended BASIC Level IV for \$249. Call 1-800-348-277B or for info 219-259-7051 and Tenex's address is P.O. The T.U.G. Club

TUG was started on Jan.28,1983. At that time it was called "TBBS". On April 1,1984 it changed names to T.U.G. which stands for "T.B.B.S. Users Group". The T.U.G. was formed to bring owners of all types of computers together. It started with one sir drive and two double disk drives run on a Radio Shack Model I c. Juter. In the past three years T.U.G. has grown from a three floppy drive system to a 5 Megabyte hard drive system!
