MEETING MINUTES - 5/29/90

The acting-president, Jia Nuckolls, called the meeting to order at 7:03 P.M. at the Round Table Pizza parlor. 14 members were present.

OFFICER'S REPORT

The minutes from the last meeting, as stated in the May newsletter, was accepted and approved on faith... (Because it wasn't received in time. DDFS! -Ed.)

Jim Nuckolls reported to the group about the Officer's Meeting which was held two weeks prior at the home of Jerry Cohen. Several topics were brought up concerning the future of 4N. Foremost, was the question of dwindling membership. In an effort to help curtail any further drops in members, it was decided that:

- 1. All members of 4N should be brought to the same level regarding peripheral equipment so that those members without a full system would not feel left out and inclined to leave the group. To achieve this, 4N will purchase any necessary equipment from active and prior members, other user groups, garage sales, etc. Once acquired, the equipment will then be resold, loaned, or leased to those members not having a full-blown system.
- 2. A survey form will be given out at the upcoming meeting to find out who might require the use of extra equipment, and, at the same time, to discern the main interests of our members regarding programs, demonstrations, tutorials, and S.I.B.s.
- Classified ads will again be placed in the computer section of the local newspapers to inform others of our Users' Group.
- 4. Other means of informing people of 4N will be pursued; including the use of posters and participation in local computer fairs.
- 5. Also, a new meeting place was discussed, one which would allow for the storage of our equipment. Jim will look into this matter.

As for meeting times, it was decided to maintain our present one until it becomes a problem with the majority of the members.

Our acting-program librarian, Jerry Cohen, reminded everyone about the two Disks of the Month to be demoed at

the end of the meeting. He also stated that the two program disks from the previous month would also be included at the special 50 cent rate.

The Newsletter Editor distributed samples of the June issue of Computer Buyer's Guide to the group, donated by Vulcan Publications, Inc. Also handed out was the aforementioned membership survey form to be completed and turned in at the next meeting. The main purpose of the survey, again, is to find out exactly which members have what in the way of hardware and software items so that 4N can better serve its members.

To get the computer to HOLD 24 LINES OF TEXT ON THE SCREEN WITHOUT JUMPING THE FIRST LINE OFF THE TOP - JUST PUT A SEMI-COLON AFTER THE 24TH LINE.

YOU DON'T HAVE TO RESTORE ANYTHING WITH THE RESTORE STATEMENT. IN OTHER WORDS, YOU DON'T HAVE TO READ A DATA STATEMENT BEFORE YOU CAN RESTORE IT. YOU CAN WRITE YOUR PROGRAM TO OPTIONALLY OR RANDOMLY RESTORE ANY ONE OF YOUR DATA STATEMENTS AND THUS TO BEGIN READING DATA FROM ANY ONE OF THE DATA STATEMENTS.

IF YOU HAVE THE EXTENDED BASIC MODULE, WHY NOT LEAVE IT PLUGGED IN AND SELECT THE FX. TENDED BASIC OPTION EVEN WHEN YOU ARE PRO-GRAMMING IN BASIC? THIS WILL ALLOW YOU TO TYPE 5 LINES ON A LINE NUMBER, WHICH WILL STILL RUN IN BASIC (UNLESS VOU PUT TOO MANY SHORT ITEMS IN A DATA STATEMENT), AND THE EXTENDED BASIC OPTION WILL ACCEPT INPUT OF YOUR PROGRAM LINES MUCH FABTER, ESPECIALLY WHEN THE PROGRAM GETS LONG. IT ALSO ACCEPTS CHANGES AND DELETIONS MUCH MORE QUICKLY, AND IS ESPECIALLY USEFUL WHEN YOU WANT TO DELETE A LARGE NUMBER OF LINES. IT WILL QUICKLY TELL YOU HOW MUCH MEMORY YOU HAVE LEFT WITH THE SIZE COMMAND (BUT YOU'LL HAVE MORE IN BASIC) AND WILL BRING YOUR REJECTED INPUT BACK TO THE SCREEN FOR CORRECTION, WITH FCTN 8. IT WILL ALSO RUN YOUR PROGRAM, IF YOU STAY AWAY FROM CHARACTER BETS 15 AND 16, AND WATCH THOSE DOUBLE COLONS.

Anyone in the TI World owning a disk system at least a month and has not yet contacted Jim Peterson at TIGERCUB Software is certainly leading a severely deprived life.

Jim has the largest collection of stuff at the cheapest prices possible for our amazing 4A. He couples this "best for the least" husiness with a fantastic knowledge of the machine and a kind, generous spirit. No one knows the BASIC and XB workings of the TI better than Jim. He is an expert in everything!

Mr. TI, as he is known by his thousands of admirers, seems to take to his computer the way Jean Henri Fabre took to ants. He is meticulous and creative and understands the soul of the 4A. I'm still in awe of his skills and dedication and influence.

There is no one in the entire TI World (unless he or she has been hiding under a rock since the 70s and has just been handed a machine)

who has not felt the influence of this mild-mannered, modest man.

I've come across hundreds of programs with his fingerprints on them: programming enhancements and tools he has given to us. For years Jim gave newsletter editors free tutorials called "TIPS FROM THE TIGERCUB" which were (and are) so jampacked with wonderful programming is hard to imagine what TI life would have been without this marvelous source. He still sends these "CARE" disks to sharing newsletter editors. He has also written the ultimate tutorial on programming in the form of subprograms that can be easily merged any XB program (including a subprogram that makes BASIC programs into XB programs). These loaded disks of subprograms (called NUTS & BOLTS) be purchased from him and readily used with your own or other programs. Jim has also written so many programs for the Public Domain that we just take for granted that these kinds of programs have "always been there." They weren't. Until Jim gave them to us. There isn't a user group library in the world that doesn't have heaps of programs from

Mr. TI.

He also writes numerous "commercial" pieces of software. "Commercial" only in the sense that they are for sale. They were low-priced and of high quality in the heydays of the 4A when everything was high-priced and too often of extremely poor quality. Years later, I still use a large number of his programs in school (SYNONYMY, MECHANICAL APTITUDE TEST, SCRAMBLE, SQUINCH (a fiendish word game), to name a very few). I wouldn't like to be without the other Tigercub utility and game programs I've enjoyed so much over the years (particularly the unendingly fascinating NUTS & BOLTS disks, which I had the honor of demo-ing at a recent computer fair. [I had the greater honor of meeting Jim at the great TI fair in Lima, Ohio.] The man's remarkable and is universally liked (which is remarkable unto itself).

[Jim's three NUTS & BOLTS disks (with a descriptively succinct manual/tutorial) are now only \$10 each. His five disks full of "TIPS FROM THE TIGERCUB", a newsletter editor's Godsend, are only \$5 each.

His 120 original programs (a refundable \$1 for the catalog) are now just \$1 each!1

Praising Jim's efforts on our behalf is not the purpose of (It's just impossible to write about Tigercub without doing so.) These disks do not contain a pile of junk you'll never use, either, They are selected from the thousands Jim has in his library. And they are catalogued and sub-catalogued and regrouped.

An example: Interested in music? Those are the 600 series. What kind of music? Well, remember those great graphic/music combos of Sam Moore? "SAM MOORE MUSIC #1" (341 sectors). It has 11 is a disk called super selections on it. But there is also a "SAM MOORE MUSIC #2" and a 3 (348) and a 4 (337) before #604 moves to "BILL KNECHT HYMNS" (334) and so on.

You get the picture. You get a disk full of the kind of things you want and can use: educational programs, graphics, printer utilities, typing, health, you name it.
