

#### 99'ER WARE

A new line of software has just been introduced by Emerald Valley Publishing Co., publisher of the 99'er HOME COMPUTER MAGAZINE. Ten cassette-based software packages are currently available. They are:

Simon's Saucer Bumbles Blossoms
Snake 'n' Eggs Evacu-Pod
Archedroid Torpedo Alley
Fleet Command Grubstake
Blockade Runner Orbital Defender

The last five titles require the use the extended basic cartridge. Suggested retail price for each 99'er-PAK is \$9.95. 99'er WARE also carries such products as dustcovers, cassette recorder adaptors, and magazine binders. #### NEW FROM TI

I am sure that everyone is now aware of the "new look" of the TI-99/4A and all peripherals. (Yes, even the P-box and monitor!) The new color is called buff - a beige/grey color. Some stores around town already have the cassette recorder in the new color. According to TI, a survey showed that this lighter color was preferred by persons in both a home and office environment.

Ed Wiest is still doing a great job of supporting the Users' Groups. Since

our last newsletter was printed, he has sent us two technical manuals. He has also sent us a copy of TI's Software Directory. This comprehensive guide lists all software currently available for the TI-99/4 and 4/A. It includes all cassette, and solid state cartridges from both TI and third-party software authors. It contains a category index, a TI category index, an author index, and a keyword index. A fifth program abstracts, briefly and reviews each piece of section, describes software. This super directory is available from our literature library (see Gene Burchfield.) If you would like one of your own, they may be purchased from TI.

#### NEW IN DISC DRIVES

Have you had trouble with your disc drive "crashing"? Sometimes the cause may be due to the humidity and temperature effects on your disc. Temperature causes the disc track to become elliptical, which causes the "crash". To reduce this problem, and also gain other advantages, a number of disc drive manufacturers are reducing the size of the disc fro the 5 1/4" to the 3" to 3 1/2" range. Contrary to what one would think, the smaller disc can actually store more bytes than the 5 1/4" disc.

One big difference is the smaller discs use a rigid case, instead of a flexible case as used with the 5 1/4" disc. This allows more precise control of the disc, which allows more tracks per inch and higher densities. The biggest advantage is more reliability and protection, and the new disc drives are being designed to be compatable with existing 5 1/4" drive controllers.

One of the main objectives of using the smaller disc is for portable computers. At some later time we may even see a built-in computer system in our automobiles, and the trend to smaller discs should hasten this possibility.

At the present, the biggest problem with using the smaller discs is that the industry has not settled on one disc size, which is hindering greater use of these drives. Once the standard is established, as it is with the 5 1/4" disc, then we can expect to see a surge in the market of drives, discs, and new software. It would behoove us to be cautious in the meantime in considering the purchase of these new drives.

# A LIGHT PEN FOR THE TI

While roaming through the SOURCE late one night, I stumbled on a subset of TEXNET called TI-IDEA. Upon examining this file I found that the feature was on building a "Light Pen". A few days later several trips to the local electronic supply houses, my finished pen was ready to try out. A TIC TAC TOE program was supplied on TEXNET that utilized the device(the program is in the group library).

If you wish to build one, the instructions and parts list are below:


#### Parts

- (1) 9-pin "D" connector
- (2) R6174/U coaxial cable
- (3) DA 20961 shield
- (4) Felt-Tip pen case or substitute
- (5) 470 K-OHM resistor
- (6) 47 K-OHM resistor
- (7) .047 uf Capacitor
- (8) TIL414 transistor
- (9) 2N2907 transistor

The photo-transistor is connected to one end of the wire and inserted in the pen case. It can be held in place by silicone glue.

All other components can be connected just before the joystick connector(they can be squeezed into the shield).

I found that it might be best to substitute a 1-500 K DHM potentiometer for the 47 OHM resistor. The output voltage seems to vary from console to console.



R1=470 K OHM resistor R2=47 K OHM resistor or pot T1=2N2907 transistor T2=TIL414 phototransistor C1=.047 uf capacitor

Parts were found at Radio Shack and Forbes Distributors.

# USERS? GRUUP CORRESPONDENCE



#### SYSTEM CRASHES

As a result of inquiries by more and more people about system crashes, and due to the fact that my computer was beginning to crash more than I could tolerate, I decided that I had no other choice than to make a trip to the local exchange center with my computer under my arm and my checkbook in my pocket.

Figuring that it was going to cost me \$45.00 anyway, I decided to make one effort to correct the crashing problem (I had already tried grounding myself, grounding the computer, wiping the computer down with dishwashing detergent, different transformers, anything else that could even remotely come to mind), so I proceeded to open the computer up and try reseating the I.C. chips inside (this is a known problem with some other computers). When finally got the computer apart I was able to see that the only plug-in chips other than the VDP Processor, which was an unlikely suspect, were four chips mounted in sockets right next to the command module connector. I heard a pleasant click when I pressed on several of these chips which indicated they had not been seated completely in the sockets. It was apparent that flexing of the printed circuit board over a period of time had caused this problem and that it is likely to happen periodically.

There are several precautions that one should take before taking the computer apart:

- You would not want to attempt this if the computer is still in warranty.
- 2. You should use extreme care in unhooking the 'on' switch after removing the bottom screws.
- 3. After separating the cover top and bottom, you should remove the two screws holding the small printed circuit board in place and swing it out of the way.
- 4. Remove the large metal box by removing the three screws accessed through holes in the metal cover, not the bolts all the way through the box.

- 5. Unplug the command module connector from the large metal box.
- 6. Remove the bolts going through the box.
- 7. After separating the box, you will see the four plug-in-chips in the middle of the printed circuit board; however before touching them make sure you have discharged any possible static buildup by touching ground.

After all the above precautions you are finally ready for the big moment and can press gently in the four I.C. chips then follow the reverse proceedure to reassemble the computer.

I cannot guarantee the above will correct all problems with system crashes; however I have not had the first crash after fixing my computer.
