THE STORY OF BITTOWN by Gary Bishop

1. Bittown Description: This story is about Bittown, how it conducts its day to day business, and identifies the major players in the life of that town. Most towns have a mayor, but our town is quite corrupt and is ran by a tyrant I will call the Big Boss. Bittown has only one street, with Big Boss determining when and who can travel down it. The various business are situated along each side of this street. The street is only wide enough for one vehicle at a time, and only a very lightly loaded vehicle at that. It seems through poor planning, lack of judgement, or ignorance, the town's only street can handle a vehicle with no more than one bag of money. Big Boss is situated at one end of the street with his helper, a very dedicated but simple minded traffic controller. This traffic controller tells any vehicle on the street which way to go, either out to a business, or in to the Big Boss. Remember, the street will only support one vehicle at a time, and the direction of traffic is determined for this vehicle.

Well, to conduct his business, Big Boss needs to move his hush money payments, bribes, and other extortion funds in and out of his businesses. Being rather crafty, Big Boss doesn't keep much cash on hand, but rather relies upon the bank he controls to handle most of his money transactions. Big Boss is rather suspicious, though, and insists that all transactions must at least pass through his hands before going to the bank.

- There are four main types of businesses along the street: the bank, several warehouses, a couple of print shops, and a library. The bank holds all of its money in safe deposit boxes, and Big Boss can simply deposit or withdraw money by telling what box he wants his money in or out of, and the amount. The amount cannot excede one full bag of money, though. Remember the transportation problem on the street? One of the Boss' stooges actually handles the transaction, driving the vehicle, and making sure he has the right deposit box. The bank has a limited number of storage boxes, but when Big Boss acquired the bank, he was sure there were enough boxes available to handle all his transactions. Now Big Boss always admired the way the Swiss Banks worked, because the only thing you needed to deposit and withdraw money was the account number. He made sure when he acquired this bank, it was set up the same. He had all the safe deposit boxes on a wall that could be accessed directly from the street. He made sure each box had its number painted on it so you could see the number from the street.
- 3. The warehouses can store and retreive money, but the front door on them is so small that only one bag of money can pass through it at a time. The warehouse can store all kinds of money, but can handle only one bag of it at once.
- 4. The print shops are the source of Big Boss' wealth. They can provide any quantity of money that Big Boss needs, but can only supply it one bag at a time. One print shop prints blue money, and for a change of pace, the other one prints yellow money. You can immediately tell which shop printed any given dollar by simply looking at its color. The print shops only provide a bag of money when asked. Any other time, they stand silent, ready to crank up the presses at a moment's notice from Big Boss.

5. The library is the only place in town that Big Boss doesn't have under his grimey thumb. The librarian is a stranger in this town, occasionally going on trips to scour up something new and fresh for this dismal excuse of a town. The library materials are for reference only, though. The librarian doesn't trust any of the inhabitants, fearing that they may be under Big Boss' control, and would not bring materials back, or deface them to spite the librarian.


- 6. Well, all the businesses have an street address so the stooges can find their way around. The stooges are only slightly more intelligent than the traffic director. At least the stooges get to drive a vehicle, handle one bag of money at a time, and visit the various business at the direction of ...you know who.
- 7. The street addresses are arranged in the simplest order possible, so the stooges can handle finding them. Some businesses are on the north side, and some are on the south side of the street. In this case, the two businesses have the same address, but with the addition of "north" or "south" are distinguishable. Mr. Big tells his stooges an address, and whether it is on the north side of the street, or the sunny south side. Now we can follow a small portion in the day of the life of the Boss.
- 8. The sun pops up from over the eastern horizon, and quickly warms up head honcho. After a quick face wash, the next order of business is to have a bunch of fresh new money printed up for him. This particular morning, blue money tickles the Boss' fancy. He wants two bags of money, and must inform the traffic director to do it. The traffic director beckons a stooge, only having just awakened from a sound sleep. following ensues: director tells stooge that Boss guy wants a bag of blue money. Director tells stooge also that stooge may go one way down the still empty early morning street to street address #1, and it is on the north side of the street. That's the address for the blue money print shop. Stooge's instructions are to go to the shop, ask for and wait for a bag of money, and return it. Stooge, with much haste, drives his vehicle down the street to the blue print shop, and knocks on the door. The print shop proprietor arouses, and complies with the order to print one bag of blue money. Stooge now has the bag of blue money in his sweaty palms, and gives fleeting thoughts of skimming just a few measly clams away from Big Boss for a rainy day. A shout from the traffic director disrupts the fantasy, and stooge now has permission to traverse back up the narrow road. He is carrying the limit that the poor excuse of a road can carry, one bag of money. Off stooge goes, still thinking of what he could do with all that dough. Stooge arryes back at the traffic director, and gives him the bag of blue money. Stooge is looking forward to breakfast, but traffic director bluntly tells him, do it all again! Grumbling all the way, traffic director tells stooge to go down the pike to the blue print shop again, and obtain another bag of money. After receiving permission from traffic director, he goes...back to the blue money printing shop, stomache-a-growling. That's nothing compared to the growling the print shop owner makes when he is told he needs another bag of money so early in the morning. Still, Big-fellow holds the mortgage on this small establishment though, so he reluctantly complies.
- 9. Well, stooge has another bag of money in his slimey paws, and figures a trip to Hawaii is at least 3 time this much, so quickly puts

Companies that produce calendars have one goal in mind: helping others keep track of days, weeks and months. It's a multi-million dollars business with a market that won't quit. Afterall, just about everyone has need for a calendar, every year.

Richard J. Bailey of Gonic, New Hampshire, is listing a number of programs as Freeware. Among them are several that produce and print calendars for any year from 1776 to 2099. These calendars are printed in a variety of sizes using Epson/TI type printers, including Gemini. The program listed here is called TINYCAL and produces, what else, a tiny calendar.

The program can probably be modified to operate using any dotmatrix printer that includes super/subscript characters. Although it is designed for RS232 operation,



users may use parallel printers simply by changing the I/O characteristics in line 280. It is in line 280 that the super/subscript characters are accessed. This line may be used as the basis

for "miniaturizing" printer output for many programs, including disk catalog programs.

The program requires Extended BASIC.

occupied, take the money on the shelf, put it in the incinerator, dispose of the old money, and put the new money back on the shelf. I check serial numbers of all my money, and any money found skimmed from money to be disposed can be traced!! I will make the life of anyone taking the afore said monies very unpleasant!" Now stooge knew this could come about, so he dutifully carried out the tasks. Once the burning and shelving were complete, we went back outside and awaited Traffic Director's permission to go back up the street. Alas, several other vehicles were waiting to move about on the street, and this stooge had to wait his turn. It seemed like an eternity, thinking if he really did the right thing by burning the Boss' money. At last, stooge's turn came around, and he went back to the Director.

- 15. Stooge asked Director if what he did was correct, but Director didn't know. All Director knew how to handle was the traffic, and the street addresses to send the stooges to. - 16. The day wears on. The sun is directly overhead now, with storm clouds forming on the horizon. It had been very dry, and some rain would be welcome. This part of the country is known for its violent weather, though. A "little" rain would be unlikely. A monsoon or full blown savage thunderstorm would be the norm. Boss grows weary of watching the tube, and decides he would like some reading material. He has been studying Spanish in his spare time, and has exhausted his supply of magazines. He hollers at Traffic Director to go get a self-teaching Spanish workbook at the library. Boss saw on TV that this material was available at the library, and you can mark up the workbook to help in learning the material.
- 17. Director to next stooge: proceed immediately to library, street address #2, north side, and retreive a Spanish workbook. Stooge, well aware of all the rules, waits for Director's permission, which is given immediately. Down the street with his empty vehicle, while he wonders if he should hit up the Boss for a raise, or at least mileage for his car. Arriving at the library, he enters the ornate doors. The librarian likes this particular stooge, but has great disgust for the Boss. The stooge makes his request for the workbook, and the librarian must contain his rage! "Boss will never be allowed to check out anything from this library! I will not support his reign of crooked businesses and

domineering the town citizenry!" Stooge knows that if he returns empty handed, he could be de-ressed. (You TRON fans should know what that is.) Thinking fast, he pleads with librarian, hoping he can make a dash for the door before librarian can catch him. But alas, stooge plans far enough ahead to realize that once he makes to the street, he must await Director's permission. A last ditch brainstorm hits stooge! "How about if I make a copy of the workbook? That way, you can keep the original intact, and Boss fellow can have a copy to change as he pleases." Librarian thinks about this for a minute. He isn't real tickled to help Boss, he doesn't want to see his friend stooge get into hot water, and besides, librarian gets a cut from the copy machine. "Sounds good to me," the librarian begrudgingly admits. Stooge copies the workbook, and under the watchful eye of librarian, places the original back on the shelf. Copy in tow, stooge heads out the door, awaits at the street for permission, receives it, and heads directly to Traffic Director's quarters.

- 18. Stooge delivers the copy, Director hands it over to Boss, and Boss, not realizing he has a copy, is happy as a clam with his new workbook. He goes about making entries in his copy, changing things in it where he wants, and states for the world to hear: "Habla Espanol!"
- Late afternoon, now. Sky is black; clouds-a-churning; storm is imminent. Boss is alarmed by how fast the clouds have approached. decides to be prepared, he will send off to a fellow crime person in the next county for emergency pumps, water proof money bags, and life boats. These instructions are given to Director. Director is taken aback. He has never seen the address Boss has given him, and such a request was rarely made! However, being the loyal servant, he grabs a stooge, gives him the address, gives him permission to go down the road, and pushes him out the door. Stooge carefully checks all the addresses on the street. and none of the match the one he has in his hand. At the bottom of the address is a footnote in very small 4 point type. He reads it as best he can while driving down the road. It says: "If this order contains an address you can't find in Bittown, proceed out of town as far as the road goes. As you venture out, look at every address along the road, and compare it to this instruction. If it matches, proceed as usual. must keep going forever until you find a match, regardless of how far you must travel." Mighty unsettling words, especially with the sky menacing. Stooge does as the instruction states, heads out of town, and is never heard from again.
- 20. No one really knows what happened to this stooge. The townsfolk speculated that he couldn't read the writing, for the address was actually in town somewhere. Others thought the road washed out before stooge found that street address, and was carried away in the torrent of rain that followed. Still others speculated that stooge made an escape to another town, maybe run by a real mayor and regular people instead of a Boss. Rumors ran rampant for a while. After some considerable time, the lost stooge was looked upon with almost folk hero status. But no one really knew for sure.
