



DISK REVIEW

This month I will continue along the line of games on disk in our library by reviewing a disk called Texret-3. This Club 99 offering has a few extended basic games among the collection but the majority of choices are in basic.

Con-4 (B): a two player game in which you try to stack up X's and O's until you have 4 in a row, either verticaly, horizontaly, or diagonaly. This seems to be a basic version of the Connect Four game by Milton Bradley.

Dodgem (B): a 1 player game in which you try to dodge walls, obstacles, and your own footsteps. You can control speed and size of playing field as well as the number of obstacles.

Ecco-chab (8): the computer is turned into an echo chamber and you must try to duplicate the sound you hear from the chamber. One or two players may compete.

Motocros (B): drive your dirt bike around a track without crashing.

Nomad (XB): you must try to navigate your car through the streets of the city without crashing, hitting drunks, or getting pinched for speeding.

Psychology (B): a 1 player game in which you try to psych out the computer and sees who plays the higher number. If you both play the same number you get a draw. Not as easy as it sounds.

SP/Scout (XB): in this one you are a space scout and must try to pick up cargo modules while avoiding asteroids and racing against the clock. It has speech capabilities.

Stan-guard (B): this is a typical shoot-em down (not up) game with you against the invaders.

Stellar (XI): in this game you are a stellar explorer and load up your ship with equipment, supplies, robots, and crew members to go off and explore the galaxy around you.

Stockmark1 (B): a simulation game in which you are given ten thousand dollars to invest in the stock of five hypothetical companies. Your assets rise or fall according to randomly generated market conditions.

DELETING NOISE

When experiencing background noise, such as humaing or buzzing in your TI and your TV there is a simple solution that can make your computer as quiet as a mouse. This tip comes from the Kentuckiana 99/4A Computer Society, v.a. North Eastern 99ers. All you have to do is adjust your modulator. Here are the steps:

- 1. Turn the volume of the TV all the way down.
- 2. Select the master title screen and fine tune for the best picture.
- Use a small screwdriver to carefully remove the cover from the modulator.
- 4. Increase the volume of the TV to 1/2 of the control range.
- 5. Insert the blade of the screwdriver into the slotted core of the coil marked "L3" on the printed circut board. This will crack too much if too much force is used.
- 6. As you're listening to the buzz on the TV, SLIGHTLY rotate the core no more than 1/8 turn in either direction until the buzz is at a minimum. Replace cover.

PIRATING MAY BE HAZARBOUS TO YOU MID YOUR SYSTEM'S BEST HEALTH!
