REVIEW By Whiz Kids

Burger Builder (By Software Specialties Inc. Denver Co.) is a copy of the arcade game "Burger Time", which involves a small man in a chef's hat trying to build a burger by walking across the various parts of the burger, causing them to fall to the next lowest level. This goes on until four complete burgers are at the bottom of the screen. Meanwhile, hot dogs, eggs, pickles, chips, and other goodies chase you. One thing that the arcade game has that the TI-77/4A version does not is the "pepper" button. On the arcade game, pressing this button causes a cloud of pepper to come out and hit the "Junk Food" causing them to be temporarily paralyzed. Another difference on the arcade game is that when the parts of the burger fall it will knock the part below it down to it's next level, creating a "chain-reaction" effect. However in the TI-99/4A version you must make sure that nothing is below the lettuce, or whatever part that you are trying to drop. In all, we feel that Burger Builder is a very enjoyable game, it has excellent graphics, good sound, and great "playability" but it is not quite as exciting, or fun as the orginal arcade version.

Strategy: The best strategy seems to be to step on the lower parts first, and then to avoid the parts on the level that you are on, but to wait to step on a part until a "Junk Food" is beneath you, causing a burger part to fall on a food item gives you bonus points, so it is advisable to get as many as possible. A good score is above 5,000.
