

Charlice was also busy making copies of disks from DTIHCG's library on request.

But the highlight of all would have to be the demonstration of the TI Emulator!, which allows you to run actual TI-99/4A software on a DOS computer. The TI Emulator! allows you to continue to use most of your favorite TI cartridges and programs even if you've had to give up your 4A computer, and the author plans additional updates to the current Version 5.01. It was really a sight to see the TI color bars on an IBM screen.

However, I'm sure those of you who were there will agree with me that the award for the most unusual, unique, and hilarious display of them all would have to go to Mike Stanfill. Not only did Mr. Mike imbue his computer display with "artificial intelligence" (and I do mean "artificial"), but he even made it walk around the room and talk back to anyone who was brave enough to get close. As it turned out it was Mike all along, INSIDE THE DISPLAY, dressed up as a TI-99/4A Home Computer with the monitor sitting atop an office file cabinet, P-Box, 4A console, and disk files. 



BEGINNER PRINTER

(14) TI WRITER AND YOUR PRINTER - PART 6

This and future articles will be written with Funnelweb 5.0 and all references to TI-Writer will be synonymous with FW5, also all printer commands will be for the Gemini 10X. For those who may not have done this, if you want to print only certain lines, you can make your print command look like this: 1 8 PIO, this will print only lines 1 thru 8, likewise you can print lines 5 thru 10 or what ever you want using the same system. (ESC 4) If you have practiced like a good student, you should be able to do a CTRL U, FCTN R quickly by now, so let's do it. Also let's do as we promised and install more than one printer command on the same page. May I suggest you use this article as your text to practice on and I will place the number or letter in parenthesis in the proper places so you can see where they must be placed to get the desired affect.

(ESC 5) (ESC E)

Again lets make the title in wide print. Where you see the 14 in parentheses just before the "TI WRITER", go to CTRL U SHIFT N you will see what looks like a trny e, this will print one line of wide print. Also you will notice the ESC 4 at the end of the first paragraph, this will print in Italics. Then at the end of the paragraph an ESC 5 which will cancel the Italics.

On page 127 of your Gemini 10X printer manual you can see a heading "SPECIAL PRINTING EFFECTS", the first of which is (ESC - 1) underlining. (ESC - 0). In this session, we will work our magic on individual words as we just did above. If you put in the commands before and after the word "underlining" it will be underlined. One thing to remember, which I do not see in the manual and don't remember seeing it in TIW, is that these commands do not take up space. For example if you have an ESC E which would require 2 spaces, the printer ignores those 2 spaces. Another way to put it, if you have 60 characters in a line and you add 2 spaces of printer commands, it will still only take up 60 spaces when printed out. Also notice, that the symbol for underlining is a - dash not an underline, which in my estimation would be logical.

Now here is something we can use in scientific notation, the superscript and subscript. Suppose you are writing a scientific paper and want to explain something using powers, like the 3rd power of 2 or the 5th power of 5. Here we go; 2 to the 3rd power is 2(ESCS 0) 3 (ESCT). The key punch sequence is this: First type the 2 then CTRL U ESC CTRL U S CTRL U SHIFT 2 CTRL U 3. This will give

you the little 3 just above and to the right of the 2. Remember there can be no spaces in the command codes if you want it to come out right.

Of course we need to turn off the Superscript, cause we don't want the remainder of the text in superscript. This is an easy one, just do an ESC T. Now You do the 5 to the 5th power.

A shortcut may be this, type the 5 then a CTRL U, FCTN R space SHIFT 2 space FCTN R, CTRL U then go back and fill in the spaces with uppercase letters. Put an S in the first space a 5 in the second and a T after the last escape symbol. There must be no blank spaces in this series. Here is another way we may explain it. 5(ESC S SHIFT 2 5 ESC T).

Should we need to use chemical formulas, we must include subscripts also. H20 we all know as water. The code for it is ESC S 0 or escape S zero.

This may be getting a little hazy for some of us, it is for me too. :) So let's do one key at a time. Start with the H.

I would suggest you copy this key punch sequence with the actual codes and any others you may use frequently and save them on disk, then you won't have to go thru all those key presses every time. In your leisure you may even build a library of them for future use.
