NOVEMBER NEETING

good to see some of you who haven't been in since last June.

After the usual minute reading, etc. the treasurer's report was read. This report (\$250 on hand) is indicating that a bad trend is developing; namely cash flowing out is exceeding cash flowing in. After a break for coffee, Earl continued the Editor Assembler lecture series started by Michal Jaegermann at the October meeting. Earl is an experienced NAIT computer instructor who is teaching himself TI assembly language and is passing along to us the things he has discovered. His experience with other machines allows him to explain some of the more complexing things about E/A in general terms.

Earl reviewed the binary numbering system and how to convert to/from decimal, two's complementing and why we need it, and defined bytes and words. Then Earl moved on to discuss in general terms the basic system operation of 1, 2, and 3 address computers and a typical microprocessor CPU. Next he covered the three internal registers in the TMS 7700 chip and explained the concept of "work spaces" used in the TII. The next item covered was an explanation of the five options on the E/A title screen. Finally the structure of assembly language was screen. Finally, the structure of assembly language was introduced and Earl handed out some pages of examples including a simple program for the beginners among us to cut their teeth on.

Michal and Earl are planning more tutorials for future meetings. Thanks Earl for an interesting evening.




